Sunny Chung

Last week marked the tragic loss of Sunny Chung, former Rochester and Gates police officer and dear friend to many of us. Mention Sunny's name to any of those who worked alongside him and an instant smile crosses one's face. Sunny's good nature and the many fond moments that we shared with him have produced memories that will last a life time. But beyond the good times that we had with him, Sunny was a man who had to face many challenges and barriers throughout his career.

As Sunny's class counselor, I had the honor and pleasure of getting to know Sunny very early on in his career. As the first ever Korean born police officer in Monroe County, Sunny faced tremendous language and cultural hurdles while working the streets of Rochester. However, Sunny was able to overcome all of these barriers, and established the foundation for an exceptional law enforcement career.

Sadly, while working for the Gates Police Department, Sunny was involved in a very serious on duty motor vehicle accident while responding to a call for service. As a result, Sunny suffered partial brain damage that ultimately ended his career. However Sunny remained a dedicated husband and father to his wife and children and remembered many of his brother and sister police officers from the law enforcement community that he loved.

A few months after I was appointed Chief, Sunny stopped by to visit and congratulate me. The accident may have changed him slightly but it could never change who he was at his core. He was warm, passionate, humorous, concerned, open and charismatic.

Sunny Chung, though retired, remained one of us; and his untimely passing is a loss not only to our law enforcement community, but to the greater Rochester/Monroe County community as a whole. Please keep Sunny and his family in your thoughts and prayers.

OFFICER MOSES ROBINSON RECEIVES YOUTH ADVOCATE AWARD

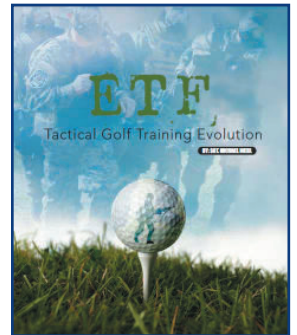

The reality is that this day of training was tough. The goal was to create a training evolution that would accomplish several goals established in the annual training calendar.



A REAL TOP GUN!

Dave Rodriguez, son of RPD Officer Tommy Rodriguez, received his pilot "wings" on Friday, May 18th in Texas. Dave is a Lt. in the U.S. Navy and has been selected to fly the F-22 Raptor. He is the only Lieutenant selected for the F-22 from his class, and the first selected since last November. This is a huge accomplishment!

Dave graduated from Greece Odyssey High School in 2006 and earned his private pilot's license at the age of 16, while still in high school. In fact, he had his pilot's license before he had a drivers license! His private instructor at Bill Law aviation said, when Dave got his license, he was "a natural pilot".



Dave was appointed to both the US Air Force Academy and the Naval Academy, but he chose the Air Force. He graduated from the Air Force Academy in 2010 with a degree in Aeronautical Engineering. Dave will spend a few weeks flying the F-16 in Nevada or Arizona prior to reporting to Tyndall AFB in Panama City, Florida for his F-22 training. Flight training for Dave consisted of 22 weeks in the T-6 (primary aircraft training) and then 24 weeks in the T-38 Talon.

MEDIC #1 RETIRES

Marty Ward retired from Rural Metro and ETF on May 25th. He worked for Rural/Metro for almost 40 years, and was the SWAT Medic for 18 years.

Marty started the Tactical Medic concept in this area, and today the RPD ETF is one of the only teams in New York State to have Tactical Medics on SWAT operations outside of NYC. Marty is still employed as a MCSO Jail Deputy, so he may look familiar to some officers. Marty also completed the ETF Obstacle Course every Qualification Day, just like every other team member, until he was 60 years old!

On Marty's last day, the entire team carried him through the full course, and over every obstacle. He carried the team for 18 years, and it was the team's time to carry him! The Team retired his ETF Medic #1 designation. As of his retirement day, no future ETF Medic will be called Medic #1.



MCAC SPEEDWAY

During the week, Jeff Colegrove works as an analyst at MCAC, the Monroe Crime Analysis Center. But in his off time, Jeff trades in his pocket protector and computer for a crash helmet and a high performance race car!

The car is called a Formula 500 car, which is an open wheel formula car. Minimum weight is 800 lbs. with driver, and it generates about 105hp. It has over 2G of lateral grip and 2.5G of braking grip. In other words, it takes only 1.2 seconds to stop from 60 mph. The car will go almost 140 mph in a straight line, and can go from 0-60 in three seconds.

At the end of each season, Jeff travels 1,200 miles to Lincoln, Nebraska to compete in the SCCA Solo National Championships. With over 1,150 competitors, the SCCA National Championship is actually the largest amateur motorsports event in the world. In 2011, Jeff and his brother had a 1-2 finish; Jeff won the national championship by just 0.148 seconds over his brother, Stefan. Over two miles of racing, this works out to about 10 feet at the finish line, which is not even a whole car length. The gap to third place was 2.5 seconds. They also set the second and third fastest times at the entire event!
